

	<p><u>Worlebury Hill Fort</u> – SW reminded people that WRA had supported NS Council to obtain their recent archaeological survey of this historic site: a handout with up-to-date details had been placed on various seat. 6	<p>ELECTION OF 2019's COMMITTEE</p> <p>SW reminded the meeting that he would be standing down as Chairman although he would like to remain as an ordinary committee member, and asked for volunteers for the position of Chairman and/or to join as a committee member, as there were 3 vacancies. As no-one came forward SW suggested anyone interested should contact a member of the committee either during the interval or at any time after the AGM. There were no dissenters: consequently, Sue Chinnick was re-elected as Secretary, John Chapman as Treasurer, Steve Sands as Membership Secretary and Lesley Pattenden, Chris Nelson and Sean Williamson as ordinary committee members.</p>	
7	<p>DONATIONS</p> <p>SW suggested that donations remain at £5 per household per annum, and this was carried unanimously.</p> <p><i>After the meeting the Membership Secretary advised that we had received donations totalling £180 at the AGM, for which we thank those concerned.</i></p>	
8	<p>Q & A SESSION – re January Newsletter:-</p> <p><u>Welcome Pack</u> – There was an example Welcome Pack at the back, and SC asked for a volunteer to keep the information up-to-date and make suggestions for anything new. <i>Two people volunteered in the break.</i></p> <p><u>The V.E.T.S. scheme</u> - SC mentioned that following the publication of our newsletter we had received a new volunteer which was excellent; however, although we now have 13 volunteers from 9 households, we still seek more people: no new volunteers came forward.</p> <p><u>GDPR</u> – SW mentioned the need for more people to volunteer their email addresses, in order to reduce the cost of printing newsletters and hand delivering them. This would enable us to share information regarding events and community matters more quickly and easily. There were membership forms at the back of the room to complete together with copies of our Privacy Notice, all of which are always available through the secretary.</p> <p><u>Future Events</u> – SC also mentioned there were forms and pens at the back for people to jot down any events they would like to see happening, together with their name and telephone number so that SC could contact them with a view to working together on their ideas.</p> <p><u>Agenda Items requested by members</u> – None were received prior to the meeting; however, Janet Warburton mentioned the number of vehicles speeding up and down Milton Hill where she lives, and asked if we could ask the Council for a “Slow Down” sign or similar.</p> <p>SC reminded the meeting that we had taken up this issue back in 2016 when we met a Richard Dillon from the Planning office who explained the reasons it was not possible to have extra permanent signage on the hill. SC said she had a file on it if people wanted more information. However, Janet was so concerned re safety, that she pressed us further and LPi explained the situation in more detail and offered that she and RW would see what the current position was.
